The last several years have seen some very important steps taken to expand the access for younger (under age 60) members beyond monthly meetings and field trips. With the evening sessions made available for lapidary, jewelry, metal smithing, and Pebble Pups, the average age of membership has plummeted. With this has come deeper involvement of these members in running the Auction, Picnic, Fall Show, and very importantly roles as Board Members. The Senior Center has been very supportive of us, allowing some members to have keys to open and close at night. We moved the Fall Show from the more-and-more restrictive and expensive Civic Center to the friendly and affordable environment of the JayCees Building. This move greatly improved the support of the visiting and shopping public, but it also improved involvement of more members, and profitability for the vendors. The Spring Auction also moved to the JayCees, allowing Saturday venues and longer hours for the sale to run. The lab equipment was completely replaced by all new equipment. The Jewelry and Metal Smithing groups were formed to facilitate lapidary enthusiasts to make beautiful jewelry from their stony creations. Obtaining membership in the Dixie Mineral Council has opened field trip opportunities never before available, to some amazing sites searching for amazing rocky treasures.



So where do we go from here, to kick off the 50th year of these Newsletters? Any new offerings for programs and activities will require a new level of involvement of our younger members. The grey-haired among us are looking to cut back, and the only way for that to happen is for energetic and imaginative replacements to step in, or we risk losing some of the items in the above list. President Mark Habercom could not attend, so Bill Friday opened the meeting and moved into the business of elections and budget approval.

Budget: The budget was approved as printed in the previous newsletter.

Membership: Bill told the meeting we had 320 members as of 31 December 2017.

One new member, Karen Van Bebber, joined the society tonight.

Auction: Shelley Curran briefed the club on the upcoming auction, April 28th from 9AM to about 3:30PM in the Jaycee building. The items for sale, as well as the time spent to arrange, run, and close out the auction, are all donations. Tax receipts are available for everyone who donates. The fundraising from the auction is an important source of income for the society. We need to let more people know about the auction this year. Let other clubs know about it through the newsletter. Try to get publicity through the arts council, through the radio and TV stations. Donations can be dropped off in the lapidary or jewelry labs Tuesday and Thursday evenings, or all day on Wednesdays.

Street signs for the Fall Show: Tony Smith reminded us to bring back any street signs for the annual show. Even signs from a few years back can be updated and used again.

Pebble Pups: Four field trips are scheduled in the next few months. Shelley Curran and Kathy Bowman are planning a cold connection metalsmithing class for the Pups in March.

Bill is sponsoring a plan to split the age group for the pebble pups. Currently there's a single age group of 8 to 15 years old. The proposed change is two age groups 8 to 13 years old and 13 to 18 years old. This lets the older members move straight from pebble pups to regular HGMS membership.

Metalsmithing/Silver: Kathy Bowman let us know that a cabochon mounting class is scheduled for February 1st. Anyone participating should use a round or teardrop shape cabochon to work with. The class will be working with copper but you can bring your own silver if you prefer.

Myra Soroczak let us know that a Links 1 class will be held in March, and a Links 2 class in the fall.

Leslie Malakowsky, who leads the Rocket City Jewelers, informed us that the project for the 7 Feb jewelry class will be a heart shaped pendant with beads. The class size will be kept small so call and sign up before the 2 Feb deadline.

Lab Report: Bill Friday reported that someone is misusing the sanding and polishing wheels and wearing them out. It looks to be someone pressing too hard and spending too much time on each stage of the wheel.

Bill let us know that Mary Gooch is offering to sell a 10 inch saw to the lapidary lab for a very reasonable price. Other equipment which is being added to the lab includes a drill press and a high speed dry sander.



MOBILE FLEXSHAFT STAND

A handy mobile stand for your flexshaft can be made easily and quickly from the base of an old swivel office chair. You can find these chairs being thrown out at office buildings and schools. I just asked the custodian in my building to set one aside for me.

To separate the chair from the wheeled base, simply remove the spring clip from the center bottom. I use a small screwdriver or a pair of pliers.

To make the stand, you'll need two pieces of threaded galvanized steel pipe and a pipe fitting from a hardware store. The first length of pipe is 3/4 inch diameter to fit the hole in most chair bases. The second piece is a length of less expensive 1/2 inch pipe.

The total length of the two pipes should be five feet. I used a two foot length of 3/4 pipe and a three foot length of 1/2 pipe. They are joined together by a pipe fitting called a 3/4 to 1/2 reducing coupler.

LOCAL METALS SOURCE

Local companies that use sheet metal typically have barrels of scrap copper, brass and aluminum sheet that they save for recycling. The shop owner/manager will usually let you go through it to select the shapes and thicknesses you want. Prices vary but will generally be close to the wholesale per-pound scrap value. For me at this time, that's \$3 per pound for copper.

I've found it's much cheaper to buy metal this way than ordering from a catalog. There are no shipping charges, and you'll be supporting a local small business in your community.

Remember to bring your work gloves if you try this. Also useful is a thickness gauge. When I asked if they had any 14 gauge, they didn't know. Turns out they measure the thickness of copper by its weight per square foot.

Clarkesville, GA, Saturday, March 10, 2018, 10:00 AM Eastern (9 am Central)

TRIP: This site is located in a band of kyanite bearing material. The material has been moved around so the kyanite is not in situ. Small blades are easy to find, but digging and some perseverance is required to find the larger specimens. This site is a fun and productive site for all ages.

FEE: \$10 per person

COLLECTING: Kyanite blades and cobbles, small mica books, and graphite specimens (rare). The kyanite ranges from gray to pale blue and may contain graphite. Some of the blades can be polished and, because of the graphite, they have a curious shimmer when they are polished.

BRING: Small blades can be found weathering out onto the surface. Bigger blades and cobbles are found by digging 8" to 24" deep. You will need scratching tools and baggies for surface collecting, and a shovel and pick for digging. **All holes must be refilled.** This site can be muddy at times, so a change of clothes would be good too.

FACILITIES: There are no bathroom facilities at the site, but there is a McDonald's Restaurant in Clarksville and also restrooms at a public park a few miles from where we will be collecting

CHILDREN: This field trip is suitable for children but they must be supervised at all times.

PETS: Because this is a working farm, pets are not allowed

SAFETY: There are electrified fences on the farm so **do not** touch any fences. Field trip leads will open and close gates. This is a working farm and there may be animals present – **do not** approach any of the animals. **Do not** enter pastures where animals are present.

DIRECTIONS AND WHERE TO MEET: We will be meeting at 10:00 am Eastern time Ingles Market (the only Ingles in Clarkesville), 199 East Louise Street (US Old/Historical 441) Clarkesville, GA 30523 **GPS Coordinates: 34.603124,-83.517801**, 250 miles from Huntsville AL

- 1) **From Atlanta**, take I-985 North towards Gainesville
- 2) I-985 will transition to GA 365/US 23
- 3) Continue on GA 365/US 23 to GA 197
- 4) Take GA197 north to Clarkesville (about 3.5 miles), bear left at the intersection with Louise Dr
- 5) Ingles is immediately on the right, behind the Shell gas station

We will meet in the parking lot close to the highway
