

#### **Upcoming Class Project : Thursday, November 1, Staked Earrings**



October's project will be staked earrings. We will construct earrings using both rivets and solder. Two styles are pictured. You will have materials in the kit to make both. The ovals and triangles pictured are three layer metal "sandwiches" which are riveted together. A jump ring is soldered on the back to attach the ear wires. The "filling" in the sandwich should be a metal color/texture that will provide contrast. If you have some 24-26 gauge textured metal you want to use, bring it to class. The Fan earrings are staked and soldered. The kit cost is \$5.00.

As always, on nights that we do not have an official project class scheduled anyone who is certified is invited to join us to work on your projects. 
Dianna O'Dell will show and explain a variety of fluorescent minerals, ones that glow with bight colors under a black light.

### About our September Featured Speaker Jerry Dickey

I am a lifetime researcher of Prehistoric Indian Cultures of the Eastern U.S. specializing in this field from age 6 - over 50 years, with actual experience in field archaeology since 12 years of age. I was President of a local chapter of the Tennessee Archaeological Society at age 15. I graduated the University of Tennessee in 1982 with a B.A. in Anthropology. I've spent the past 19 years in the collector community traveling to shows, museums, and seminars in the Southeast and Midwest studying artifacts on a regional basis, including 19 years as an authenticator of Indian artifacts for the public.

### Mineral of the Month – Howlite By Leslie A. Malakowsky

Howlite is calcium borosilicate hydroxide (Ca<sub>2</sub>B<sub>5</sub>SiO<sub>9</sub>(OH)<sub>5</sub>), a member of the Borate group of minerals found in evaporite deposits such as in the floors of desert playas. When an aqueous solution containing chemical sediments evaporates, the sediments concentrate and crystallize to form a water-soluble mineral – an *evaporite*. A dry lake is a basin or depression that contains standing surface water until it permanently evaporates. Dry lakes are known as *playas* (Spanish for "beach") in some parts of Mexico and the western United States.



There are about 100 different borate minerals. Howlite is one of several well-known *hydrous* borate minerals typically found at Boron, Kern County, California and in other playa deposits of Southern California. Other members of this group include kernite, borax, ulexite and colemanite. These minerals are soft and readily soluble. Some borates, such as boracite, are more similar to Silicate minerals because they are hard and resist weathering. But these *anhydrous* (water free) borates are rare.

Howlite was first discovered near Windsor, Nova Scotia, in 1868 by Henry How (1828–1879), a Canadian chemist, geologist and mineralogist. Gypsum miners, who considered the unknown mineral to be a nuisance, reported it to How who called it *silico-boro-calcite*. James D. Dana (1813-1895), an American geologist, mineralogist and volcanologist, later named it *howlite* after How.

The most common form of howlite is irregular nodules or masses that sometimes resemble cauliflower. The surface is white with a gray to dark gray erratic pattern. (If you visited the Rock Food Table at the Huntsville Gem, Jewelry, and Mineral Show, you would have seen a serving of howlite on the table!) Specimens as small as 3"-4" in diameter and as large as 10"-12" in diameter are commonly found at the Sterling Borax Mine, in Tick Canyon, Los Angeles County, California. Specimens weighing up to 100 pounds have also been found there!



Distinct crystals of howlite are exceedingly rare having been found in only a couple of localities worldwide. The crystals are tabular, flattened prisms up to 1cm long occurring in clusters. They were first reported from Tick Canyon and later from Iona, Nova Scotia. The clusters from Tick Canyon are opaque white with fine grey or black veins in an erratic pattern, with a sub-vitreous luster. The crystals from Iona are colorless, white or brown and are often translucent or transparent.

Howlite in massive form is prized for making decorative objects such as small carvings and for making jewelry. Because of its porous texture, howlite is often dyed to imitate other minerals, especially turquoise. This is because howlite's superficial patterns are similar to those of turquoise. (Magnesite (magnesium carbonate) is another white mineral whose superficial patterns are similar to turquoise, so it, too, is often dyed a light blue color that mimics turquoise.) Howlite is also used in its natural state in jewelry that looks similar to the jewelry in which turquoise is used. In those markets, the trade names "white turquoise" or "white buffalo turquoise" are sometimes used.

White varieties of turquoise from Arizona and Nevada are also marketed as "white buffalo turquoise." But you can distinguish white turquoise from howlite because white turquoise is not as hard or durable as howlite. White turquoise is chalk-like with a Mohs hardness of 1, so it requires stabilization. Blue and green varieties of turquoise have a Mohs hardness of 5-6, and they have been used in jewelry since antiquity because of their unique hues. But dyed howlite (and magnesite) are more economical and more durable, so they are becoming more popular for use in jewelry than dyed stabilized white turquoise.

(This time of year, watch out! Your wulfenite may howlite at your moonstone!)

#### SPOT SANDING BRUSH

Sometimes you have a little discoloration or debris to clean from the bottom of a pocket, from an area of coarse textured surface, or from a small space between two soldered objects. Finding something to get into those close areas is always an effort in creativity.

One tool I have for these special occasions is a glass fiber spot sanding brush. It's great for cleaning a small area and doesn't leave deep scratches, only a faint satin finish.

#### SILVER SOLDER FROM SCRAP

Sometimes you need a lot of silver solder to complete a piece the way you want it to be. For me it was when I was trying to join several castings. But silver solder is expensive, so I found a way to make my own from scrap with a little help from a penny.

First step is finding out what's in a solder. A search through the reference books (Tim McCreight or Erhard Brepohl) or a Google search will turn up recipes like:

```
* Hard - AG 80% CU 13% ZN 7%; * Medium - AG 70% CU 20% ZN 5% 
* Easy - AG 63% CU 30% ZN 7%
```

The silver (AG) and the copper (CU) are easy to come by, but finding some zinc (ZN) has always been my problem until I found out that our pennies are almost all zinc. According to Wikipedia a US penny minted after 1982 weighs 2.5 grams and is 97.5% ZN and 2.5% CU. So all I had to do is add a penny to some copper and a pile of silver scrap.

I chose to use Sterling scrap so I adjusted for the amount of copper in it as well as the amount of copper from the penny. Here's what I used for components of Medium solder:

Melt the silver and copper first in a melting dish, mix well with a carbon rod or titanium solder pick, add the zinc (penny) last, mix again, and pour into a small mold. The zinc is added last because melting it causes some to vaporize, and the fumes are a safety problem (They're a gray-green color). Be sure to have good ventilation.

To check the solder's melting temperature is correct (medium), I put a sample of the homemade solder on a piece of copper sheet along with a known sample of hard, medium and easy solders. I then heated the plate from the bottom and watched as the easy first melted, the medium melted, the homemade melted, and finally the hard.

Additional notes on converting the ingot to sheet, strip or wire form - If you have access to a rolling mill, that will be the fastest way to proceed. Either roll out the ingot into a sheet and cut strips or roll it out as wire if your mill has the grooves. If you don't have a mill, all you have to do is forge out the ingot into a rough sheet of the gauge you'd like and then cut thin strips with bench shears. Be sure to anneal the sheet every so often as you forge it.

#### Saturday, October 20, 2018, Hogg Mine, Troup County, GA, 9:00 AM - 5:00 PM

**TRIP:** The Hogg Mine started out as the Oxford Mine in 1942 to mine beryl to produce beryllium. Commercial operations shut down in 1960. The site has been opened off and on since then for specimen mining and is currently managed by Chris Painter. The site is a surface mine pit approximately 650 feet long with an east – west orientation.

**COLLECTING:** The parking area is at the east end of the pit. As you enter the pit from the parking area there is a trench approximately 150 feet long and to your right. Large green Aquamarine beryl and pockets of green Aquamarine beryl have been found there. As you enter the main pit area, there is a tailing or spoil pile to your left that came out of the pit in front of you. There have been several large nice gemmy Aquamarine beryl specimens from this area. The main pit in front of you has a plethora of treasures, Rose Quartz, Smoky Quartz, banded Quartz, Beryl in matrix with the quartz, Tourmaline in matrix with the quartz, etc. The last area of note is at the western end at the back of the pit. There has been a new smaller pit dug in the last year and some very nice Blue Aquamarine Beryl has been found. The new pit was dug because an old drilling report indicated that Amethyst was found. There are pieces of Amethyst coming from the new pit. **FACILITIES:** There is an outhouse available on site. There is plenty of free parking. The mine operators also cook hamburgers and hot dogs and have drinks. Lunch plate is \$8.00.

**FEE:** For 17 years old and up is \$35 per person, 16 years old and younger dig for free. **TOOLS:** Bring all the tools you have: pick, shovel, screen, rock hammer, hand sledge, rock chisel, bucket, hand cart, etc. The Hogg does sale some tools in limited quantities. It would be a good idea to bring an extra change of clothes. The pit can be muddy and wet.

Directions: Where we will meet:

McDonald's, 2408 Whitesville St, LaGrange, GA 30240

This is at Exit 13 on Interstate 85 in LaGrange.

GPS 32° 59′ 30″, 85° 01′ 50″

**When:** I would suggest arriving at McDonalds as early as 8:00 am, although you can arrive earlier. This will give you time to pay and fill out the required paper work. At 8:15 am the first caravan will be going to the mine. The first to arrive and sign in will be in the first caravan. The mine is approximately 3 miles from McDonalds. If you do arrive late and no one from the mine is at McDonalds, call the number in the contact information below.

**Directions and Drive Time:** The best way to determine driving directions and time is to enter the McDonalds address above into the directions destination block in Google Maps and enter your home address in the starting point block. 170 miles from Huntsville - time zone change.

**Note:** If you would like to make a weekend trip out of it and stay at a cabin or camp site 30 minutes away as a group? Then you are in luck, there is a GA State Park Campground (Chattahoochee Bend, Newnan, GA) with available RV/ Trailer or Tent Sites & Cabins to stay overnight or the weekend. For dig weekend, anyone wanting to reserve a RV/ tent site at the Chattahoochee Bend State Park, 425 Bobwhite Way, Newnan, GA to camp over the weekend (or night) is welcome. (RV & Cottages Available). Call 800-864-7275 for reservations or go to <a href="https://gastateparks.org/">https://gastateparks.org/</a>. Dolores Osborne-Hensley will be at campsite 124 for the weekend with hot chocolate and a campfire to warm the October bones up. Try to get a campsite near 124, as to make a group event.
