



PROTECTING FINISHED SURFACES

I figure that any accidental scratch I make on a piece means about 15 minutes of extra sanding and polishing. So after finishing major surfaces I typically cover them with some masking tape to avoid any scratches when doing final work like cleanups and setting of stones. The blue masking tape used by painters works particularly well because it doesn't leave a sticky residue.

PICKLE PRECAUTIONS

A hot pickle pot gives off fumes that bother me in my home workshop. I get around that by using my pickle cold. I mix it a little stronger than for a hot pot so that it works almost as quickly. I keep it in a large-mouth plastic bottle and cap it off whenever I'm done using it.





Metal Smithing/Silver Group by Kathy Bowman & Shelley Curran

Next Project Class Thursday March 7th. 6:00 pm

Etched mixed metal, multilayered, linked bracelet. Two part class for March and April.

Part 1. March 7th. 6:00pm.

Class will chemically etch three different metals to be used to fabricate a mixed metal layered linked bracelet.

This technique is a fairly simple way to produce richly patterned base metals for multiple uses. In this case a bracelet.

The kit will include all metals and necessary chemicals and materials. Kit cost of \$10.00.

Preference will be given to certified members at sign up, as materials produced in this class will be used to build a bracelet in part two next month.

If interest warrants an etching class will be offered again at a later date.

Part 2. April 4th. 6:00 pm

Class will use the metals we etched in part one to build the bracelet. The patterned metals will be shaped and layered and soldered together to make individual links. Each link will be different. Most will make six links to get the necessary length. The links will then be finished into a toggle closure bracelet. Basic soldering skills required.

Kit will include everything necessary to finish the bracelet. Cost will be minimal as metals and such were purchased last month.

Science Olympiad Regional Competition 2019

HGMS has been honored to be a part of the UAH Science Olympiad for a number of years because of our experience in Rocks and Minerals, and Fossils. The Olympiad this year, focused on Fossils, was held on Feb16 at UAH, There were 18 Middle School teams followed by 18 High Schools teams from schools all over north AL. We had 5 HGMS volunteers who helped arrange the rooms for testing, monitored the teams during testing, and graded the tests. The



tests were long and difficult, on purpose so that there wouldn't be multiple ties with perfect scores. There weren't any but one team did answer 2/3 of the questions correctly. Mineral of the Month – Pumpellyite (var. Chlorastrolite)

This month's mineral is actually a gemstone. Chlorastrolite is a variety of Pumpellyite, which is a group of closely related sorosilicate minerals that form a chemical series. (Sorosilicates are silicate

minerals characterized by double tetrahedra in their crystal structure.) Pumpellyite was first described in 1925 for occurrences in the Calumet mine in Michigan and named for United States geologist, Raphael Pumpelly (1837–1923).

Each member of the pumpellyite group has a slightly different chemical formula due to varying amounts of magnesium, iron, manganese and aluminum. Chlorastrolite's formula is Ca₂(Mg,Fe)Al₂(SiO₄)(Si₂O₇)(OH)₂·H2O. It occurs in blue-green to olive -green finely-radiating or stellate masses. Upon first glance, it resembles wavellite, a phosphate mineral that occurs in translucent-green radial or spherical clusters. But Chlorastrolite's radiating clusters occur in a distinctive "turtle back" pattern, which roughly resembles a turtle shell, and the clusters tend to have a subtransparent to opaque chatoyancy (an optical reflective effect as seen in tiger's eye).

Chlorastrolite is found in only two locations in the United States: the Keweenaw Peninsula of the Upper Peninsula of Michigan and Isle Royale in Lake Superior. The mineral occurs as amygdaloids (cavities in volcanic rock filled with secondary minerals) in the basalt along the shores of Lake Superior. Wave action wears away the basalt and loosens the mineral which is found as beach pebbles and granules in loose sediments. But Isle Royale is a National Park, so unfortunately, it's illegal to collect specimens there.

Most gem-quality Chlorastrolite stones are very small; it's rare to find one that is larger than half an inch. The largest gem-quality stone measures 1.5 inches by 3 inches and is housed in the Smithsonian Natural History Museum.

Chlorastrolite was first described from Isle Royale, Lake Superior by C. T. Jackson and J. D. Whitney in 1847. Because of its rarity and uniqueness, it was named Michigan's state gemstone in 1972. (Not to be confused with Petoskey stone (fossilized coral), which is Michigan's state rock or stone.)



Chlorastrolite is known by many names: greenstone or Isle Royale greenstone, Lake Superior greenstone, green starstone (most common in Michigan's Upper Peninsula), and turtle back because of the stone's overall mosaic pattern, particularly in polished pieces. Rounded masses of Chlorastrolite from Nipigon Bay (on Lake Superior, Ontario, Canada) are sometimes called zonochlorite, but that's a misnomer. The confusion may be because zonochlorite is sold as faux Chlorastrolite. There's even a variety of Chlorastrolite called uigite found only on the Isle of Skye off the coast of Scotland.

Faux material notwithstanding, this stone is very popular with rockhounds and lapidarists. Chlorastrolite pebbles are tumbled to bring out their beauty, and the stone is cut and polished into cabochons for making jewelry. Turtle-shaped pendants with Chlorastrolite cabochons in their centers are a favorite!
