We have been exploring our options for a couple of months now and it came down to the economics of a restricted vendor and activities floor space. Without going into the details, it was the only choice we felt we could make. Also, we will NOT

be having our September meeting because of the same restrictions that caused the show cancellation. But I have good news! The lapidary lab, the metals group and Rocket City Jewelers have actively been working to get their areas up and running and plan on resuming operations soon! Annual fem, Jewelty & Mineral Show Cancelled for this Year

The HGMS Board and Committee Chairmen met last week to discuss the practicality of hosting our Fall Show on the second weekend in October, recognizing the need for the income for the vendors and a promise to give them advance notice incase of cancellation, the need for the income for the HGMS, and the enthusiasm of the buying public for the items for sale by our array of vendors, we had to also take into account the Virus.

The Governor's continuation of the Virus Related Restrictions on activities, including particularly the requirement of maintaining 6' distance between patrons, would have required the Fall Show to space the vendor's booths 18' apart, seriously reducing the number of booths which could be fit inside the Jaycees building and making it difficult for patrons to view the merchandise. Billboard and Radio Advertising had already been cancelled due to deadlines for cutoff in advance of the event in order to receive refunds of the payments. The Board members therefore voted unanimously to cancel this year's Show.

The decision had to be made in early September. If the restrictions are lifted in early October, there would only be nine days prior to the show do all advertising, recruit workers, prepare our own materials and equipment for use in the Show.

Auction Update

Due to the cancellation of our March auction fundraiser, and subsequent loss of revenue for the club, it's been decided to take the auction on line. After much research I've chosen a platform designed specifically for non profits. It features real time bidding from any device. We hope to go live in October. Info on how to bid and a link to the site will follow in next months newsletter. Be ready to shop!

Progress at the new Gem & Mineral Education Center

Work crews have been regularly gathering at the Center to complete the saw and arbor benches, work tables for Metals and Rocket City Jewelers, and shelves for the storage rooms. There is still work left to finish before the Center opens fully in early October, and we should be ready then for an OPEN HOUSE. We have been given permission to work in the facility as long as we observe distance, masks, and sanitizing.

In the Lapidary Lab, we did a shakedown checkout with the members who have been helping with the restoration. After the saws were pressure washed, we re-loaded them with water mixed with a lapidary grade surfactant called LubeCool, but it failed miserably in cutting agates. So the oil is back in all of the automatic saws and they again work fine. One saw had a stripped cross feed screw and brass nut under the vice, which were replaced with new ones from Highland Park. Most of the saw shaft bearings have gotten noisy, so we purchased a set of new ones, and one pair was installed. Quiet!! The others will be replaced soon. Several of the arbor water hoses were leaking and all of those have been fixed. The sediment tank and secondary filter tank are now working, with a homemade cheese cloth filter inserted. Work has begun on the locker cabinet. The holes have been cut in the front wall, but the main cabinet and all the doors are yet to be attached. Cameras are coming soon, and the secure access system is out for bids.

There has been a lot of progress setting up the Metalsmithing room over the past few months. We have added some new equipment now that we have the additional space. We still have some details to finish but it shouldn't be too long before we are open for work sessions. We are working on the permanent benches but in the meantime we have some sturdy individual tables to use.

Unfortunately because of Covid 19 we will need to make some changes:

Masks will be required.

If you are ill or running a fever you will be asked to leave.

Work tables will be spaced 6 feet apart.

Work Sessions will be limited to 6 students. You may have to sign up for a specific day. This will have to be determined later.

Class size will be limited to 5 students per session. Classes will be offered in 2 sessions: 1st Thursday of the month and the following Monday. Because space per session is limited you must sign up for a particular day as part of class registration. We will do all we can to accommodate your request, but you might be asked to change the day if too many people request the same session. Last minute changes need to be cleared with an instructor so we stay within the limits.

Hopefully there will be a vaccine next year and we can go back to our full capacity of 10 students and 2 instructors. It is a big space and we have room to accommodate that many people without crowding.

Mineral of the Month – CharoiteBy Leslie A. Malakowsky

One of my favorite colors is purple, so when I ran across a charoite cabochon many years ago in a jewelry supply store here in Huntsville, I was thrilled! Although skeptical that the cab's lovely lavender color was natural, I bought it anyway, and I was happy to learn, after doing some research, that it's a naturally occurring mineral!

Charoite is a rare potassium silicate mineral with the formula K(Ca,Na)2Si4O10 (OH,F)•H2O. It's a component of the potassium feldspar metasomatic rocks (metamorphic rocks that have undergone chemical alteration by hydrothermal fluids) found in only one location in the world: the confluence of the Chara River (for which the mineral was named) and the Tokko River in the Tokko River Basin, Siberia, Russia. It's at that location where a syenite (a coarse-grained intrusive igneous rock similar to granite but low in quartz) of the Murunskii Massif (an exposed portion of shield rock) intruded into and altered local limestone deposits producing metasomatic rocks.



Charoite was reportedly first discovered in the 1940s, but it was unknown to most of the world until it was described in 1978. Some mineralogists believe that its drab opaque appearance in the field may have contributed to its late recognition. (Since its discovery in Siberia, charoite has also been discovered in southern India.) Minerals associated with charoite include aegirine, quartz, pectolite, and galena.

Charoite ranges in color from translucent lavender, violet, lilac, purple, and light brown with a vitreous, silky, or pearly luster. The color variations are due to the presence of impurities such as aluminum, iron, manganese, strontium, and barium. It's a fairly hard mineral ranging from 5 (apatite) to 6 (feldspar) on Mohs scale. Its crystal habit is massive, and it has an unusual swirling, fibrous, and sometimes chatoyant appeonarance. (In mineralogy, chatoyance is an optical effect resulting from the fibrous nature of a mineral or from fibrous inclusions within a mineral. The term was coined from the French "œil de chat", meaning "cat's eye".) These features, along with its

incredible color, led some people to think at first that charoite was a synthetic or artifically enhanced mineral.

Like the mineral sugilite (<u>Rocket City Rocks & Gems</u>, May 2019), charoite's hardness, pearly luster, and beautiful color make it an ideal mineral for lapidary and jewelry making.



RAISING A CABOCHON

When a cabochon sits too low in a bezel, the bezel can hide a lot of the stone. The solution is to either sand down the bezel height or boost up the stone. But if you choose to to raise it up, the question is what is the best material to use?

I was taught to use fine sawdust but now think that might be a problem when used in rings. I reason that rings will frequently get wet, which would cause the sawdust to swell in size and push the stone against the bezel. Then when the sawdust dries out, the stone would be a little loose.

In any case, I now prefer to insert a flat sheet to boost up my stones. It can be a scrap of metal or some plastic from product packaging or old credit cards. In either case, just cut a piece to loosely fit into the bezel and drop in the stone (with some dental floss) to check it's height.

TRANSPÁRENT CABS

When bezel setting a transparent cabochon in silver, I usually cut out the back of the bezel to allow background light to show off the colors and patterns in the stone. If this is not possible or appropriate, I worry that the silver bezel will tarnish under the stone and will ruin its brilliance. What to do?

My solution is one extra step before setting the stone. I place a piece of thin silver Mylar plastic under the stone to act as a mirror that will never tarnish. Mylar is readily available in craft and gift wrap stores, or in a pinch from a party balloon supplier. You may even want to experiment with using colored or patterned Mylar (i.e. diffraction pattern) under some stones.
