

# The 2022 Fall Gem Jewelry and Mineral Show

After months of intense planning, it took two days just to put it all together, including an entire day of helping the dealers unload and set up their displays, setting up our Signs, Flume, and Fluorescent Room, assembling Display Cases, arranging the Demonstration Booth. Information Booth, and Ticket table, getting the ATM set up, capped off with a delicious Vendor / Volunteer Appreciation Potluck Supper, after which the Kids Area was arranged with the Fossil Dig, Scavenger Hunt, and Rock Identification.

The doors opened at 10:00 Friday morning with a long line waiting to get in and shop for treasures amongst the myriad of offerings of all things jewelry, gems, minerals, rocks, fossils, lapidary tools, and Knick knacks. Our caterer offered a delicious menu for lunch Friday and Saturday, and the Club supplied Pizza for lunch on Sunday. Hourly Door Prizes were claimed by lucky ticket holders, Raffle items were bid for, the "Guess the # of Rocks" jar garnered many dozen guesses - there were 106 of them.

By Sunday at 5:00 we were ready for it to wind up, and everyone pitched in to take it all apart, store it in the big van and flume trailer, and help the dealers pack up and get out. Mineral of the Month – Quartz (var: Phantom) By Leslie A. Malakowsky

Quartz is a hard crystalline mineral composed of silica (silicon and oxygen) with the chemical formula SiO<sub>2</sub> (silicon dioxide). It's the most abundant, widely distributed mineral on Earth's surface and the most abundant mineral in Earth's crust, second only to feldspar. Quartz is a common rock-forming mineral in silica-rich igneous, metamorphic, and sedimentary rocks. It defines the value of 7 on Mohs scale of hardness, and it's highly resistant to chemical and mechanical weathering.

Due to the wide variety of environments in which it forms, quartz is perhaps best known for its impressive ar-



ray of crystal shapes, forms, and colors. *Macrocrystalline* quartz such as rock crystal is visible to the naked eye. (*Microcrystalline* quartz such as agate consists of dense microscopic crystals visible only under magnification.) Typically, visible quartz crystals occur as 6-sided prisms with a vitreous (glass-like) luster, each crystal terminating in a 6-sided pyramid.

Phantom quartz (also referred to as "ghost", "specter", or "shadow" quartz) is a variety of transparent to semi-transparent quartz that consists of one or more overlapping crystal growths in its interior. That is, a smaller crystal or crystals within a larger one. The inner crystals are known as "phantoms". Phantoms commonly occur in colorless rock crystal, but they can also be found in smoky quartz, citrine, and amethyst.

They're visible because they developed in separate phases and each phase included variations in composition. For example, phantoms can be mineral inclusions such as chlorite, goethite, or hematite, or other varieties of quartz such as milky quartz, smoky quartz, or amethyst. Phantoms can be milky white, or shades of gray, blue, green, orange, red, purple, or brown.













Phantom quartz has the same characteristics as regular quartz: shiny, durable 6-sided prism-shape crystals composed mainly of silicon dioxide. But it's the phantoms that make this unique variety of quartz highly prized by collectors, jewelry makers, and artisans. Phantom quartz is found worldwide, especially in Arkansas and Brazil.

## **November Class Dates**

The next project class will be revisiting the *Hinged and Riveted Pendant* we last taught in 2017. The size and shape of your pendant will be up to you. We will cover the construction of the hinges, riveting and setting a cabochon. Because this is a project that covers several different skills, plan on attending several work sessions this month to complete it. You will need to select the stone for the bottom part of the pendent before the class since that will be crucial to your design. The first part of the project will cover finalizing your design and construction of the hinges that connect the top and bottom portions. Next we will cover riveting textured metal on the top half of the pendant and finally adding the bezel for the stone on the bottom half. Depending on progress, we might continue the project in December classes to finish it. None of the skills are difficult, but all of them in one project will take some time to complete.

We completed 3 new benches this summer so we now have actual benches for 8 students per class session (no sitting at the white tables!) By the first of the year we should have the other two completed which will raise the number of available seats for each class session to 10 students.

Email voting method. We will start emails with "Issue for discussion" finalized "Issue for Vote." 5 days of discussion before it can be voted on.



Lowell wants to know how many tables we will need for our kids events. Mike is putting together the table count.

additional ways to save time, avoid frustration or improve quality at the bench. These new tips cover problems in fabrication, stone setting, casting, soldering and polishing.



### WINDING JUMP RINGS

If you need a few jump rings the same size, it's easy to grab a round rod and wind as many as you need. But when you need a lot of them, some form of winder saves a lot of time. A variable speed screw gun makes quick work of winding the coils. Screw guns are quite inexpensive at discount stores and are remarkably handy for odd jobs in the shop and around the house.

To wind a coil, just bend a right angle on the end of the wire about a half inch long and insert this into the screw gun chuck. Then wind slowly, keeping a tight coil. I like to rest the end of the mandrel on the edge of the table or bench pin. Finally, one note of caution. If you are wind-



ing an entire length of wire, be careful as you get near the end of the wire. If the end passes under your thumb, it can cause a nasty scratch or cut

#### TOUCHING UP A BEZEL

Pumice-Wheels-Medium/332722?pos=2

Pumice wheels are good for touching up a bezel after you've set the stone. The hardness is about 6 on the Moh's scale, less hard than quartz, so it shouldn't scratch any of your agates or Jaspers. However, I'd avoid or be real careful of using pumice near the softer stones like Turquoise, Amber, Howlite, etc. If you're unsure about the hardness of your wheels, test them on a piece of glass. Glass is about 5 ½ on the Mohs scale, softer than quartz. So if the wheel doesn't harm glass, it's safe for use on the Quartzes and hard-

My preference is the one inch diameter ones such as those shown at riogrande.com/Product/AdvantEdge-

Cumberland Furnace, TN Saturday, November 5, 2022, 10:00 AM to 2:00 PM CDT Registration Required FEE: There is no fee.

TRIP: We are heading to Cumberland Furnace to collect slag. The slag was a byproduct of making iron. Some of the slag is quite colorful in shades of blue and green ... some with swirls. The slag is easily cut and polished and makes nice pendants – it is too soft for rings.

COLLECTING: Our target is a dump pile on the banks of the stream that runs through Cumberland Furnace (access by crossing a large field owned by the community). This dump pile is located about a ¼ of a mile from the parking area. Although the dump pile has the greatest potential, slag can be found anywhere along the banks (both upstream and downstream). Another way to search is by wading downstream from the furnace if the creek is low. I am not sure if conditions will permit – bring wading shoes just in case if you wish to collect in the stream.

BRING: You need to bring a hand tool, trowel, small shovel, etc. to dig in the slag pile and gloves to protect your hands. Bring a backpack or small buckets for carrying. Boots or wading shoes are recommended as your feet may get wet otherwise.

TERRAIN/SPECIAL CONDITIONS: Quarter mile hike through the woods to the site, the path will be slightly overgrown. There is creek and some small streams, so your feet might get wet. Stream should be low this time of the year.

CHILDREN (Yes): Must be 6 years or older. PETS (Yes): Leash required. FACILITIES: No facilities at this site. Nearest gas station is one mile away.

REGISTRATION: Click <u>here</u> to fill out a registration form. If you are unable to attend the trip, please be considerate to your fellow rockhounds and let us know as soon as possible so someone on a potential waiting list can take your slot(s).

DIRECTIONS AND WHERE TO MEET: Directions and meeting place details will be emailed to registered participants.
