




Everyone enjoyed making the chainmaille pumpkin earrings, and the Basket Weave Bracelet was a good introduction to wireweaving.

We will be continuing the Hinged and Riveted Pendant in December. The first part of the project covered finalizing your design, construction of the hinges that connect the top and bottom portions, and soldering on the bezel. In December we will cover riveting textured metal on the top half of the pendant and setting your stone (if you haven't done that yet). The last step will be inserting the hinge pin to connect the two sections. None of the skills are difficult, but all of them in one project will take some time to complete. If you signed up for Part I in November, you do not have to sign up for December Class. Come on the same night you signed up for in November. (Thursday was completely full so if you came on Thursday and want to change to Monday night, let Shelley or Kathy know.)

Mineral of the Month – Carnelian

This month's mineral was inspired by Fall colors! Carnelian is a variety of chalcedony, a cryptocrystalline (composed of microscopic crystals) variety of quartz (formula SiO₂) and a member of the silica group of tectosilicates. (Tectosilicates, or "framework silicates," have a three-dimensional framework of silicate tetrahedra with SiO₂. This group of minerals constitutes nearly 75% of the Earth's crust.) Other minerals in this group include sard, sardonyx, onyx, heliotrope, bloodstone, agate, moss agate, chrysoprase, jasper, flint, and chert.



Color, translucency, toughness, and the presence of impurities and banding are all good characteristics of chalcedony. For example, carnelian is generally translucent red, brownish-red, orange, or amber. It's often a solid color, but it may contain lighter and darker zones, or cloudy areas within the same stone. Carnelian is tough; not brittle like macrocrystalline quartz varieties that occur as large crystals.



"cornelian", which is reminiscent of *cornucopia*, which signifies the abundance of harvest. The names carnelian and sard are often used interchangeably, but there are differences between the two minerals. Both carnelian and sard contain impurities - iron compounds that cause a range of hues from yellow to orange to reddish-brown (carnelian), to deep reddish-brown to almost black (sard). Generally, carnelian is redder and sard is

browner. Carnelian has a Mohs hardness of 6.5 - 7.0 (comparable to tanzanite, which can be scratched with an iron nail), while sard is harder and tougher. Banded carnelian is sometimes classified as both carnelian and agate or *carnelian agate*. Carnelian that consists of red and white bands is known as *carnelian onyx*, which is also a synonym of sardonyx. Carnelian can sometimes be confused with jasper. Carnelian is generally translucent while jasper is always opaque. And carnelian always lets light shine through when viewed from the edges. Plus, jasper usually exhibits multicolored patterns but carnelian doesn't.

Carnelian (and other varieties of chalcedony) form in low temperature/pressure environments. These minerals are abundant in volcanic rocks, in limestones, and in the upper portions of weathered rocks. In the United States, well-known sources of carnelian include New Jersey and Oregon. Internationally, significant sources include Peru, Sri Lanka, and Thailand.

Carnelian has been used as a semiprecious gemstone since antiquity. The red variety was used as beads in the Early Neolithic period. Early Greeks used carnelian in broches and rings. Today, carnelian is still a favorite gemstone for jewelry making. For example, it's cut, formed, and polished into cabochons, beads, and rings, and carved into cameos, animal figures, and ornamental objects.

additional ways to save time, avoid frustration or improve quality at the bench. These new tips cover problems in fabrication, stone setting, casting, soldering and polishing.



Pre-Made Bezel Cups

As a general rule of thumb I assume it's going to take me 15 - 20 minutes to make a bezel for an ordinary cabochon, so for some projects buying pre -made cups can save a lot of time. But if you go this route, keep in mind three things. First, try to get cups made from fine silver, not sterling. Fine silver is softer and burnishes over the stone more easily.



Second, you may have trouble matching the shape and size of the stone with the shape and size of the bezel cup. Purchased cups can only be found in a limited number of standard sizes. You may have to adjust your choice of gemstone to match the cup. The other consideration is that pre-made cups often have fairly low side walls. While these are fine for low-dome stones, they're not dependable for stones with steep side walls.

Lastly before setting, check the fit of your gemstone in the cup, particularly around the bottom. The bottom corners of a stamped cup are much more rounded than a bezel you would fabricate vourself. This causes a problem with stones that have a sharp edge around the bottom. Burnishing the bezel over one of these stones will place a lot of stress on the stone and may cause it to crack. To avoid this, I round off the bottom edge of the stone with a diamond file (or use sandpaper on soft stones).

Dividers

They can be used to transfer a measurement. Let's say you need a 7mm wide strip of sheet metal. Set the spacing between the divider tips to 7 mm on the ruler. Then lay the sheet on the bench, put one tip against the edge, and run the dividers down the edge scribing a line parallel to the edge.



Dividers can be used to mark equal segments of a line or arc. For instance, assume a line between A and B that might be straight or curved, and you want to divide it into 5 equal lengths. Set the dividers to an estimate of the

distance. Starting at Point A, use the dividers to mark off five lengths along the line. If you end up short of Point B, lengthen the distance on the dividers. If you end up overshooting Point B, shorten the length of your dividers. After a few tries, the length on the dividers will be the exact distance you need to mark the 5 segments.

Dividers can let you quickly find the center of a circular disk. With one tip of the dividers at the edge of the disk, set the other tip to an estimate of where the center might be. Fix one tip of the dividers at the 3 o'clock position and scribe an arc with the other tip near the center. Do this again from the 6 o'clock, 9 o'clock, and 12 o'clock positions. The arcs at the center will form a small four-sided box. The center of the box is at the center of the disk.

Morris Island, Mount Pleasant, SC Saturday, December 3, 202

Meet at 7:30 AM Eastern Time - Trip 8:00 AM to 12:00 PM Eastern Time

Registration Required by November 15th Limit 60 People

Fee: \$50 for the chartered boat to the island

TRIP: We are heading to Morris Island to collect Miocene fossils (teeth and bones) that have been deposited through Charleston Harbor dredging operations. The trip includes a scenic boat ride across Charleston Harbor that passes by Fort Moultrie and Fort Sumter where the first shots of the civil war occurred.

COLLECTING: Our target is surface collecting fossils on Morris Island beach in Charleston Harbor. Morris Island is used as a spoil deposit area for dredging Charleston Harbor and the spoil material contains abundant fossils. You reach the island by a boat that takes folks to the back side of the island where you are dropped off to collect.

BRING: Bring a backpack or small bucket along with zip lock bags and wrapping paper for carrying your finds. Bring your own snacks and drinks

TERRAIN/SPECIAL CONDITIONS: Boots or sturdy tennis shoes (that you don't mind getting wet) are recommended for walking on the beach. Bring weather appropriate clothing because you will be exposed during the boat ride (boat has a roof but not enclosed) and on the beach.

CHILDREN (Yes): Suitable for children, 5 years and older., Pets - No

FACILITIES: No facilities once you get on the boat.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION: Hotels are available in Mt. Pleasant and a little further away in Charleston, SC. Hotel rates should be lower due to being outside of tourist season. Early December is an excellent time to visit the Charleston area. **REGISTRATION:** We have access to two boats that hold up to 30 people each so we have to limit the number of folks to 60 individuals. Therefore, we need an RSVP by November 15th so that our club can contact the outfitter to confirm our boat needs. If you have reserved a place but are unable to attend the trip, please be considerate to your fellow fossil collectors and let us know as soon as possible so someone on a potential waiting list can take your slot(s). Click here to fill out a registration form. If the trip is full, click here to fill out a waiting list form.

DIRECTIONS AND WHERE TO MEET: The meeting place will be in the Mt. Pleasant area. Once you reserve, you will be informed of the exact meeting location to board the boat. There are restrooms available **before** you board the boat. Please bring the fee (cash or check) and give it to Ron Ahle. Please arrive 30 minutes early to complete payment and fill out a release form.
