- 4. The 2024 Board Members are: Mike Harrison President. Shelley Curran Vice President, Clara Goode Treasurer, Bill Friday Newsletter Editor, and James Yack Interim Secretary. Gene Powers, Les Bartel, Doug Blakeslee, and Theresa Chivers are the Board Members at Large.
- 5. Board meeting will be next Tuesday December5th. Lessons learned from the show and budget talks.
- 6. Treasurer's report has \$14,667 in the checking. The show has \$14,950 spendable. \$5,398 is taxes to be paid for the Show Vendors, \$12,000 is held back for possible Show cancellation in 2024. The show brought in \$3,291.
- 7. Membership has 106 memberships that have not renewed. Please make sure dues are paid for the next year by Dec 31. All unpaid memberships will be dropped on Jan 1, so we are not paying club SFMS fees on them.
- 8. RCJ is back in business. Please read the newsletter for times and dates. You must RSVP to classes. There are no certificates needed for classes, but you must RSVP. The classes fill up fast.
- 9. Metalsmithing: Please read the newsletter for times and dates. You must be certified with a torch to participate in most of the metalsmithing classes. The next torch certification class will be in January.
- 10. Lapidary lab has one saw that needs repair.
- 11. Pebble Pups will meet in November at the Senior Center on Nov 30. The Pups meet on the 4th Thursday of the month but will not have a meeting in December. Meetings start back in January.
- 12. The show had another successful year, and we are looking forward to next year. The food truck did very well, and we hope they will be the food vendor for our auction.

December 5, 2023 HGMS Board meeting

Meeting started at 6:30 by President Anthony Zwilling. In attendance were Bill Friday, Clara Goode, James Yack, Shelley Curran, Gene Powers, Les Bowers, Theresa Chivers, Mike Harrison, and Dianna O'Dell,

Net income for the Fall Show was appx \$3,200. Previous shows have been appx \$3,000. Clara needs to get with Lowell and review the numbers.

Possible improvements for the show:

A case of water needed on the set-up days.

We need to find extra UV bulbs or purchase new light fixtures. There are many problems with the older lamps and power supplies, an upgrade would be recommended.

Potentially the Ben E. Clement show next summer may be able to help with the costs. Anthony will be the contact for this trip.

For the Fossil dig we should have a poster of the possible finds within the dig.

Water Fountain did not work at the Jaycee's and the restrooms. Need better maintenance through the entire day.

Work stations should have schedules for the volunteers so we will know who will be at workstations at the correct time.

We need a volunteer coordinator.

We could have email notification set up to inform the public well ahead about our big upcoming events. A list of potential recipients will be collected at each Show

Our advertising needs some improvement. We need an advertising coordinator. We should reach out to the news outlets such as The Tennessee Valley News. We need social media presence. Christy Willingham is hopeful to help Diana O'Dell with our Facebook profile.

If we book the billboards a year plus in advance, we should be able to get better visibility. We should get a space in Senior Living Magazine.

We need a new show chair coordinator. Tony is tired, Lowell is training Jan as Volunteer Chair, but we will need more help.

The Geo-Cracker guy did not have a good presence. We may move or shift around vendors, but this would need to be discussed with Lowell and the vendors.

Potentially we could have a vendor food order form to help them when they cannot go away for meals.

Do we need to have a counterfeit bill checker? Probably not.

Pebble pups get to keep the money they made on their Wheel of Rocks from the Show. We did better with the raffle this year due to engaging the public more. There needs to be a door prize and raffle coordinator. We should suggest to Tony about having a minimum value amount expected from donations for our door prizes.

We should have more rock slabs for sale. Brian Burgess may be able to be a vendor for working stones instead of only jewelry and specimens.

Rumor is we may have some new vendors next year trying to mix up offerings. We have a long waiting list..

If the individual activities don't spend their money by the end of the year, it goes back to the general fund. Clara will send out a first draft of the 2024 Budget and all the individual activities need to add any modifications they may need. There is no practical limit on how much money can be carried over from year to year in the club account. We have approximately \$8-9 thousand in show fund that can be used for projects.

The Fluorescent room needs upgrade. Suggest use a pop-up frame to be donated by Dianna O'Dell and cover it with custom fit black cloth.

2024 is the last year for Clara to be our treasurer. She has been organizing to make the transition easier when the time comes. We need another person on the checking account. The board voted unanimously that Theresa will be added to the club's checking account. This will be done in January.

Square has a way to link the HGMS for current and new members to make payments online through their site. We would charge the fee from Square to the new member. The biggest problem Theresa has is whether she can document the members' names to make sure they get on the membership list. It is expected that Square will allow us to use a custom form for our club memberships. This may start to be implemented next year after more discussions.

Potential discussion on where we are to have our board meetings. Should we have more board meetings? Most folks like the thought of having board meetings once a month after the general meeting. The board meeting will be the 4th Tuesday of the month for next year.


Thursday nights December 14 and 21. December 21st will be our last open studio for this year, we'll start back up on January 4th, 2024.

Mineral of the Month – Flowstone "Bacon" Leslie Malakowsky



This month's mineral was chosen in honor of National Bacon Day on December 30th (apologies, vegetarians). This article is short and well, salty because it focuses on a specific type of cave formation known as cave "bacon".

Speleothems are mineral deposits that form gradually over time in natural caves due to water seepage through native rock. (The name speleothem comes from the ancient Greek words *spélaion* meaning "cave" and *théma* meaning

"deposit".) More than 300 variations of speleothems have been identified. Many factors influence their shape and color such as the chemical composition of the rock and water, water seepage rate, water flow direction, cave temperature, cave humidity, and so on. The majority of speleothems are calcareous (composed of the calcium carbonate (CaCO₃) minerals calcite or aragonite). They result from water seeping through rocks composed of limestone or dolomite and dissolving the carbonate.

Flowstone is one of the most common types of speleothems. Other types include dripstone (stalactites and stalagmites, for example) and cave crystals. Flowstones are sheetlike deposits of carbonate minerals that form where water flows down cave walls or along cave floors. "Drapery" or "curtains" are thin, wavy sheets of calcite that hang downward. Cave "bacon" is drapery that consists of various colored bands. The presence of iron oxide or copper creates a reddish brown color, while manganese oxide, mud, or silt creates dark brown or black colors.

Cave onyx is a term used to describe various types of flowstone that are considered desirable for making decorative objects. This term originated in the Tennessee-Alabama-Georgia area and the Ozarks in the 19th century to name calcite flowstone with banding that resembles true onyx. There are a number of caves in the United States where cave bacon and cave onyx occur. In the South, the main locations are Mammoth Cave, Great Onyx

Cave (in Mammoth Cave National Park), Crystal Onyx Cave, and Onyx Cave; all in Kentucky.





TEMPLATES

Whenever I have to make more than 2-3 exact copies of a sheet metal component, I think of making a template. Templates let me easily draw the shape of an item to cut out.

Art stores or online sources like cooltools.us/ and kingsleynorth.com/ sell templates for common shapes like circles, ovals, hearts, etc. but for nonstandard shapes, I make my own out of a scrap of sheet plastic or sheet



One example is the brass template in the image that let's me quickly trace the design of ginko leaf earrings onto silver sheet. Another is the nickel template which makes it easy to drill a pattern of holes for pin inlay into wooden handles.

TESTING FOR SILVER

Often you need to identify some of those unknown "silvery" pieces of metal in the bottom of the toolbox or some piece of old jewelry that is not hallmarked. Is it silver or is it something else?

Of course, if you need to know exactly what you have, it's best to send your metals off for refining. But inexpensive silver testing solutions can be used to help distinguish higher silver content alloys from alloys that have the same appearance but with little to no silver content, like German Silver or Nickel.

I purchased a half-ounce bottle of JSP Silver Testing Solution #GT41. It's not a rigorous analytic test, but it lets you know if you're on the right track. And it's inexpensive. Mine was only \$3.

With a fresh solution you have an instant reaction after applying it to the metal being tested. The procedure is simple - apply a small drop and watch for a color change. Note that the acid will leave a slight mark, so choose a spot that is out of the way or will be easy to polish.

If you suspect the object is silver plated, you should file a little notch somewhere inconspicuous to expose what metal is below the surface. Otherwise, all you test will be the surface plating.

Here's the reaction I got when testing various metals:

. Fine silver Red/Orange

. Sterling silver Brick Red

. 80% silver 20% copper . Dark red changing to gray

. Brass Yellow changing to blue

. Nickel Gray-green

. Copper Yellow changing to blue

. Steel Black

. Stainless Steel No color change

Caution - If you do any of this testing, know that you are handling a reasonably strong acid. The GT41 label says it includes nitric acid and potassium dichromate.

Wear safety glasses.
